
From the Chair



On 26th September we will be looking at exoplanets, which are planets orbiting other stars. Discovery of such bodies has really taken off recently and forms an interesting quest in our search for alien life.

On 24th October we will have the second part of a talk on astrophotography by our outside speaker Alex. The first session proved to be a fascinating insight into this area and the follow up promises to be equally mind-blowing.

GREECE IS THE WORD!

VEGETARIAN MOUSSAKA (serves 4-6)

For the next stop around the world on our CDWU culinary odyssey, we find ourselves in Greece (via the BBC Food website!) for a moussaka. Aubergine is always the key ingredient, often layered



with minced lamb and a bechamel sauce topping, but other variants can be found across Turkey and the Middle East. Here though, lentils and potatoes are used to make a vegetarian version, which went down well at our latest CDWU meeting.

Ingredients

160g/51/2oz red lentils.

650g/1lb 7oz potatoes, scrubbed.

1 tsp olive oil.

2 onions, finely chopped.

2 garlic cloves, finely chopped.

4 sprigs thyme, leaves picked.

1/2 tsp dried oregano.

1/2 tsp ground cinnamon.

1 tbsp tomato purée.

400g tin chopped tomatoes.

1 vegetable stock cube.

1/2 tsp sea salt.

2 large aubergines, thinly sliced.

2 tbsp roughly chopped flat leaf parsley.

250g/9oz ricotta.

50g/13/4oz mature cheddar, grated.

Freshly ground black pepper

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6 (can wait until 20 minutes in, to save energy).
- 2. Put the lentils into a bowl. Cover with water and set aside to soak.
- 3. Put the potatoes into a saucepan, cover with water and bring to the boil. Turn the heat down and simmer for 15–18 minutes until just tender.
- 4. Whilst the potatoes are simmering, heat the oil in a large sauté pan, add the onions and cook over a medium heat for 5–6 minutes until just softening.
- 5. Add the garlic, thyme, oregano and cinnamon and cook for 1 minute, stir in the tomato purée and cook for a further minute.
- 6. Add the tomatoes, salt and pepper and bring to a simmer. Fill the tomato

- tin with water and add to the pan. Do this once more and add the stock cube (this should be 800ml/1pint 8fl oz of water in total).
- 7. Drain the lentils and stir into the tomato sauce, bring to the boil and simmer over a medium heat, stirring occasionally, for 20 minutes until the lentils are soft and the liquid nearly all absorbed.
- 8. Meanwhile, drain the potatoes and run under cold water until cool enough to hold. Using a spoon, scrape the skin off of the potatoes, then cut into slices about 7mm/3/8in thick and set aside (if using new potatoes, keep the skin on).
- 9. Heat a griddle pan until hot then griddle the aubergine in batches until browned and softened.
- 10. Spoon half the lentil sauce into a medium ovenproof dish then layer half the potatoes and aubergines over the top. Top with the remaining lentils, potatoes and aubergines.
- 11. Put the ricotta into a small bowl and stir in the grated cheese. Spoon the mixture over the aubergines and smooth out to cover the top.
- 12. Bake in the oven for 20–25 minutes, or until heated through and golden brown.
- 13. Sprinkle with the parsley and serve with a green salad.
